One chemical engineer intern was supposed to work for a trona company, the other chemical engineer was working for a research institute until he was let go, and the mechanical engineer intern was supposed to intern for a mechanical design firm in Texas. Overview

The Workforce Development Training Fund (WDTF) is a grant program that provides opportunities for Wyoming citizens and businesses to invest in increasing the skills of the workforce. The goal of the fund is to not only grow the skills of workers, but strengthen businesses operating in the state to create a more economically viable Wyoming. The fund is also an important tool used by economic development entities to entice new businesses to relocate, build and grow in Wyoming. Grant options include: Business Training Grants, Pre-Hire Grants, Pre-Obligation Grants, Apprenticeship Grants, and Internship Grants.

The Workforce Development Training Fund is funded through interest earned from the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund and through an appropriation of State General Funds by the Wyoming State Legislature. The Workforce Development Training Fund's (WDTF) total operating budget for the 2019-2020 biennium was \$4,890,869. This report provides an overview of expenditures in Fiscal Year (FY) 2020.



Business Training Grants

WDTF introduced a new, web-based grant management system for the Business Training Grants that allows businesses to access the system through a Google platform, offers increased accessibility, ease of use and functionality for Wyoming businesses. This new grant system went live in October, 2019 and 284 businesses have created an account in the new grant system.


In early 2020, COVID-19 pandemic had a direct impact on the number of Business Training Grant applications and contracts. WDTF staff reviewed 677 applications, totaling \$934,959.00; but from February through May 2020, 161 applications were rescinded before they were able to go into contract and 89 of the applications that went into contract were cancelled. The number of applications decreased dramatically as training all over the country was cancelled. Fortunately, some training was able to take place as providers quickly moved to on-line learning. Many providers tried to reschedule their training to later in the spring and summer, but some contracts still needed to be



cancelled as it became clear that the training would not take place as anticipated. 44 applications were denied due to various reasons.


Business Training Grants

In FY 2020, the Workforce Development Training Fund Business Training Grants supported training for 155 Wyoming employers in 18 industry sectors.



Business Training Grants


Business Training Grants were utilized by 21 counties.



In the new grant system, a total of 155 businesses applied for funding for 743 employees. Many businesses utilized the Business Training Grants repeatedly. The businesses consist of 101 private businesses, 45 not-for-profit organizations, and nine county hospitals across the state.


Pre-Hire Economic Development Grants

In FY 2020, the Workforce Development Training Fund approved four applications totaling \$797,116.10. As a result of this funding, 260 individuals received training at an average cost of \$3,066 to support three major industries.




Apprenticeship Grants

In FY 2020, the Workforce Development Training Fund approved six Apprenticeship Grant applications totaling \$463,959.00. As a result of this training, 103 individuals received training at an average cost of \$4,504 to support five major industries.



Internship Grants

In FY 2020, the Workforce Development Training Fund launched a new option, Internship Grants, to Wyoming businesses for the opportunity to provide structured learning experiences to individuals to enhance their work skills, knowledge, and abilities. WDTF approved ten Internship Grant applications totaling \$249,634.00. Twenty-three individuals will receive training at an average cost of \$10,854 to support eight major industries.



Expenditures

Total WDTF funding expended, including operations, in SFY20 was \$2,662,945. The following amounts show expenditures for each Grant option:

- •\$1,129,307 Business Training Grants;
- •\$ 709,530 Pre-Hire Grants;
- •\$ 183,280 Apprenticeship Grants;
